
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Farewell From Your National Officers

The National Order of the Arrow Committee constantly is looking for ways to improve and further develop the program of the OA.

National Chief

A few new programs were announced at the National Council of Chiefs sessions on Monday and Tuesday. They included Leadership in Service, Jumpstart, the 2003-2007 Strategic Plan, and Philmont Spring Break, among other things.

The first of these - Leadership in Service – is a tentative plan that was established to broaden the Order's s<mark>pher</mark>e of service t<mark>o</mark> include <mark>our</mark> communities. The idea is for the lodge to focus a little more on the third aim Plan, introduced at the opening show, of Scouting, citizenship, by organizing or sponsoring a community

service project.

This element of citizenship is vital to the success of our nation as a whole. By incorporating it into the Order of the Arrow program, we are made more aware of Scouting's long-

term purpose to "breed" new leaders for the success of our nation's future.

The second cutting-edge program, Jumpstart, will launch January 1, 2003, for use as a resource for new Arrowmen. It will be an online area where Arrowmen can ask questions and receive answers and information about areas of the lodge that might interest them. The logic behind creating such an opportunity is to allow newer Arrowmen the chance to understand what the OA is truly about and why they should be getting involved.

The new 2003-2007 Strategic is designed to guide the direction of the Order in years to come, and emphasizes the following areas: leadership, service, and financial

The Strategic Plan describes in detail the ways in which these three focal points will have a positive effect

on our members, lodges, and councils. If you are interested in reading this plan over, please ask your lodge chief (or his designee) for the copy he received at the NCOC – or view the plan online at www.oa-bsa.org.

The great wild fires that recently swept across the northern parts of Philmont Scout Ranch in Cimarron, New Mexico, destroyed large sections of the reservation. Three week-long adventures will be held around the 2003 spring break time period allowing those age 18-25 to see Philmont in the springtime, while at the same time helping to repair the much acclaimed Scout reservation.

Judging from these exciting and creative innovations, the future of our Order does indeed seem even brighter. The National Committee believes that if they are utilized correctly and to their fullest, these programs will prove to be assets to lodges across the nation.


